#### Mandate


Plan for all modes of transportation consistent with the region's growth and development to ensure the safe, efficient, and coordinated movement of people and goods.

## Transitioning to Link Nova Scotia

- Amendments to the JRTA Act
  - Broaden the scope beyond a one-time, HRM-specific transportation review.
  - Update Governance structure
  - Create new Ministerial order-making power
  - Establish authority to create regulations
  - Expand definition of region to include other municipalities



#### Delivering the Regional Transportation Plan

- Government decision to release
- ➤ Implementation of Short → Medium → Long-Term initiatives
- Access funding through the Canada Public Transit Fund

## Halifax Harbour Bridges

- A Nova Scotia Crown Corporation created in 1950 by legislation.
- Responsible for the constructing, operation and maintenance of two suspensions bridges that cross Halifax Harbour.
- > There are nine commissioners on board of directors appointed by Municipality of Halifax and the Province of Nova Scotia.
- > Tolls were collected since the opening of the MacDonald Bridge in 1955.
- > 33 million annual crossings.
- HHB was a Government Business Enterprise



#### Toll Removal

- During the November 2024 Election Campaign, the Progressive Conservative Party promised to remove the toll on the harbour bridges.
  - To make it more affordable for Nova Scotians to travel
  - > To ease congestion at the toll booths
  - Only toll bridges in the province
- On March 17, 2025 tolls were set to zero.



## Toll Removal Implications

- Status of a GBE changed
- Operating Grant of \$15 million, Capital grant of \$85 million
- One time addition to Province's debt of \$300 million.
- Require legislation change to set to essential set the tolls to zero.




## Infrastructure Changes

#### Toll Removal Concerns


- Speed and safety
